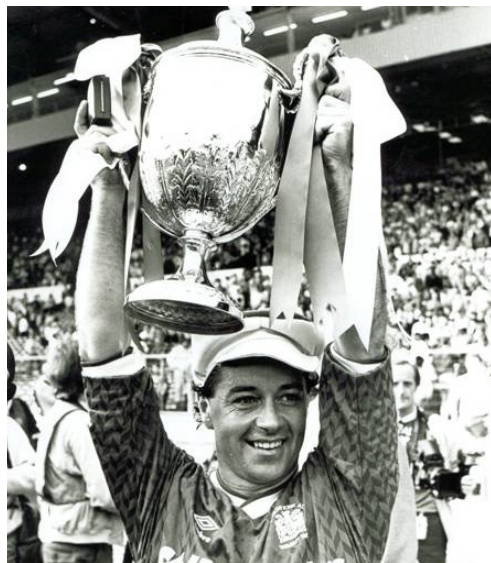
A BRIEF HISTORY OF TOWN

The original St. Helens Town club was formed in 1901 and played at Park Road, behind the Primrose Vaults public house. Although it was known as the Primrose Ground, the players changed further down Park Road at the Black Horse pub. Playing in the Lancashire League and Lancashire Combination, the team enjoyed some early success, but struggled after the Great War and appears to have folded midway through the 1928/29 season.

The club was re-formed by George Fryer and a group of local businessmen in 1946. They took out a lease of the former cricket ground at Hoghton Road, Sutton, adjacent to the St. Helens Junction railway station and, although it entered in the FA Cup in the 1946/47 season, a team could not be raised in time to fulfil its tie with Prescot Cables.

Friendly games were played, then local team Derbyshire Hill Rovers were taken over in April 1947, those players forming the nucleus of the team which entered the Liverpool County Combination at the start of the 1947/48 season. St. Helens Town soon began to prosper and early results included a sensational 10-4 win over Everton "A" on 6th December 1947. Former German prisoner-of-war Bert Trautmann joined the club in the Summer of 1948, the strapping goalkeeper helping the team to win its first trophy, the George Mahon Cup, which was secured with a 2-1 win over Runcorn at Prescot on 7th May 1949. Crowds averaged over 2000 that season, peaking with a league record attendance of 3012 against Burscough in October 1948.

The following season, 1949/50, Town entered the Lancashire Combination and, despite losing Trautmann to Manchester City in October 1949, they won the Second Division title in some style the



following season, three players, Albert Leadbetter (36), Harry McCann (32) and Terry Garner (31) all netting over 30 goals apiece. An all-time club record attendance of "between 8000 and 9000" witnessed a friendly game against Manchester City, arranged as part of the Trautmann transfer deal, in April 1950 and another 4000 witnessed a second match with City the following season.

Although relegated by a slender margin from the First Division in 1951/52, the club continued to look forward, even contemplating Football League status and, in order to further its ambitions, moved to the former St. Helens Recs. rugby league ground at City Road. Initial crowds were encouraging but, despite success, the club decided to move back to Hoghton Road in October 1953, where they remained until April 2000.

Town produced a number of fine players who joined Football League clubs, including Bill Foulkes (Manchester United), John Quinn (Sheffield Wednesday) and John Connelly who joined Burnley, later transferring to Manchester United and who played in the England 1966 World Cup winning squad. More recently, Dave Bamber scored goals in all four divisions of the league with a host of different clubs, starting and ending

his league career at Blackpool and in more recent times, Karl Ledsham, who had a productive career at conference level with Southport, Lincoln City, Barrow and Stockport County before moving to the USA.

Following a second relegation in 1956, St. Helens Town continued to play in the Lancashire Combination, winning the Championship in 1971/72, by nine points ahead of Accrington Stanley.

However, the formation of the Northern Premier League in 1968 led to a gradual drain of stronger clubs from the Combination and St. Helens joined the Cheshire League in 1975, becoming founder members of the North West Counties League seven years later. They held the proud record of being the only club



to play in the NW Counties' top flight every season until they were relegated in April 2015, conceding an injury-time equaliser to Silsden in the last game of the season, a match they had to win to stay up.

Town enjoyed a golden era in the late 1980s, just missing out on an appearance in the First Round proper of the FA Cup in 1985/86, losing to Morecambe in a Fourth Qualifying Round Replay, but they obtained ample compensation by winning the FA Vase at Wembley in 1987, beating near neighbours Warrington Town 3-2, with two goals from Phil Layhe and one from Brian Rigby.

They were regular promotion candidates for many years, largely due to the scoring exploits of Steve "Pellet" Pennington, who grabbed 216 goals in 351 games, his season's best hauls of 45 in 1993/94 and 46 in 1997/98 just failing to beat the club record of 47 scored by Phil Stainton in 1963/64. Former club captain Andy Gillespie won the NW Counties' golden boot with 34 goals in the 2015/16 season and netted another 24 times the following season.

Town moved from Hoghton Road in 2000 to ground share with St. Helens RFC, as part of the merger into the new Sporting Club St. Helens. Developing the new Saints stadium took years longer than anticipated, and when Knowsley Road closed in 2010 Town became nomads, plaig variously at Ashton Town, Ashton Athletic, Prescot Cables and Atherton Collieries. Town returned to St. Helens Borough in August 2017, playing on a 3G surface at Ruskin Drive, after St. Helens Council redeveloped the facilities.

The 2021-22 season saw Town in the NW CFL First Division North. It was a disastrous campaign, with only four wins and four draws from 36 league games. The club finished bottom of the table, 21 points adrift, and was relegated to the Liverpool County Premier League.

A consortium of Town fans bought the club from St. Helens RFC in Summer 2022. They took the decision to move it to the Cheshire League, believing it offered the most constructive environment in which to rebuild the club. It was a difficult decision, however, as it involved having to start at the bottom of that league system, a further two divisions down. The 2023/24 season was the club's first in Cheshire League Division 2. The following season Town finished 11 points clear having lost only one league game in the whole campaign, securing their first title for more than 50 years and promotion to Division 1.

The rebuild is ongoing.

FALL OUT BOY

We welcome Daten today. A club whose history is rooted to British Nuclear Fuels. As a child of the 80s I thought I'd reflect on my own North West nuclear journey and a certain little TV film that changed my life.

The 1984 BBC television film *Threads* remains one of the most harrowing depictions of nuclear war ever broadcast—and that's not me being dramatic, it's that bleak. Set in Sheffield, it follows ordinary people as global tensions quietly bubble away before boiling over into complete catastrophe, because people are rubbish. What makes it so unsettling isn't just the mushroom clouds, but the slow, grim unravelling of everything we take for granted. No Hollywood heroics, no last-minute saves—just the slow painful end of the world as seen from a council estate.



For viewers in 1980s Britain, it hit far too close to home. This was peak Cold War, when the idea of nuclear war wasn't some distant sci-fi plot—it was something adults talked about in kitchens and kids half-understood while watching the news. The government's "Protect and Survive" advice didn't exactly fill you with confidence either. Stay indoors, paint your windows white, and hope for the best—cheers, that'll sort it. *Threads* basically took that advice, held it up to the light, and said, "Yeah... good luck with that ya blerts."

Growing up in northern England at the time, it all felt a bit too familiar for comfort. The streets in *Threads* looked like ours. The people sounded like people we knew, kinda. It wasn't New York or some far-off place getting flattened—it was somewhere that could've been an away-day away. And that's what stuck. As a kid, you'd go to bed wondering if some maniac leader would push a big red button. Rational? Possibly not! But try telling that to an eight-year-old who's just seen civilisation collapse at 9.30pm on BBC2.

Then, just to really lift the mood, along came the Chernobyl disaster in 1986. Suddenly, nuclear danger wasn't just a film—it was on the news. Words like "radiation cloud" and "contamination" were being thrown about, and no one seemed entirely sure where it would end up. You'd hear things about not drinking too much milk or rain being "unsafe," and that was that—you were convinced the weather itself had turned against you. Hard to enjoy a kickabout when you think the drizzle might finish you off.



And as if nuclear war and radioactive rain weren't enough, there was acid rain too. That one really sounded like something out of a comic book. Rain that melts forests? Brilliant. You'd look up at the sky like it personally had it in for you. It all fed into this low-level, background worry that the world was, at any moment, on the verge of packing it in.

What *Threads* did so effectively was take all those fears and give them shape. It didn't just show the bang—it showed the years after, the cold, the hunger, the confusion. It stripped everything back and basically said, "This is what's left." No dramatic music to soften it, no comforting ending—just a slow fade into a world you wouldn't recognise.

Looking back now, there's almost a strange humour in how grim it all was. Not laugh-out-loud funny, obviously—more that dry, northern kind of humour

where you just shake your head and go, "Well... that's a much in it." But at the time, for a lot of us, *Threads* didn't feel like entertainment. It felt like a warning you hadn't asked for, delivered a bit too realistically, and watched a bit too young. And once you'd seen it, you couldn't quite unsee it.

Anyway, the world is still a chaotic shizhole and I guess I don't need to explain that. But....

ST HELENS Town backed up an impressive midweek performance against Congleton to take another three points at home against Upton with an emphatic 7-1 victory.

The game would mark a special occasion also as the 150th appearance in Town colours of 'Captain Fantastic' Liam Diggle.

He entered the field through a guard of honour from his team mates to the strains of 'Town Called Malice' by The Jam and by the end of the game the crowd were chanting his name in appreciation of his efforts in the famous blue shirt.

But in between those two book ends, Town dominated a game that had promised to be a tricky afternoon against a team that had held the home team to a 3-3 draw earlier in the season.

It was the visitors who threatened first through lively winger Tom Berry with a couple of early efforts that were saved by Jenkinson.

The deadlock was broken though on 28 minutes when after a tremendous through ball from St Helens Borough Food Pantry player of the match Pacey Garrett, Charlie Simpson was set free and his work allowed Ethan Wetton to finish from close range.

Soon after followed the moment the entire crowd had been waiting for when Liam Diggle drove the ball home from close range into an empty net for Town's second in a fitting moment on his big day.

The second half saw Town ramp up their efforts further with a headed goal from Jack Critchlow and sweet strikes from Taylor Prescott twice and Wetton as the latter pair each bagged a brace.

Town's other goal was from Ryan Cook which would chalk up Ben Noonan's third assist of the game and it could have been more if two elaborate team moves had been converted when first Cook went close to his second and then Prescott went closer to his hat trick with a spectacular back heeled effort.

The only damp spot was that Town conceded from a set piece when Upton's Dan Evans pulled one back, however that would not dampen the spirits too much at Ruskin on glorious sun baked afternoon and some of the second half football on show was an entertaining watch for the Town crowd.
