some of whom have had horrific experiences in their lives. Spending time with them is an education, in the power of the human spirit, the power of football as a force for good, and the basic decency of our community in helping people in need.

We are proud to play our small part in contributing to that, and grateful to the team for enriching our lives. Meanwhile, some of the episodes in the protests about asylum seekers have been very worrying. I can only imagine how it has made them feel. I hope we see more compassion and understanding in the weeks and months ahead, as we're stronger together, in football and everything else.

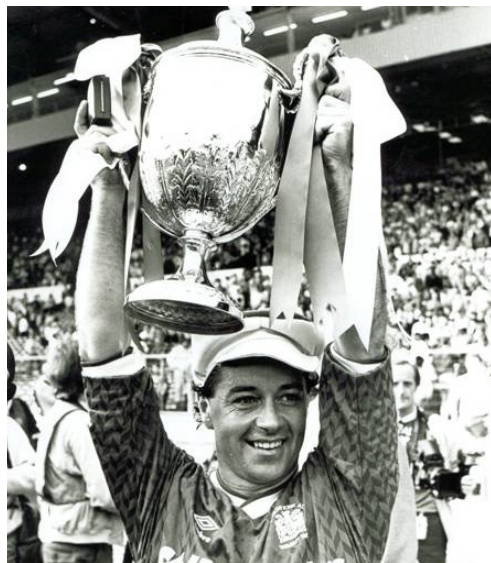
# A BRIEF HISTORY OF TOWN

The original St. Helens Town club was formed in 1901 and played at Park Road, behind the Primrose Vaults public house. Although it was known as the Primrose Ground, the players changed further down Park Road at the Black Horse pub. Playing in the Lancashire League and Lancashire Combination, the team enjoyed some early success, but struggled after the Great War and appears to have folded midway through the 1928/29 season.

The club was re-formed by George Fryer and a group of local businessmen in 1946. They took out a lease of the former cricket ground at Hoghton Road, Sutton, adjacent to the St. Helens Junction railway station and, although it entered in the FA Cup in the 1946/47 season, a team could not be raised in time to fulfil its tie with Prescot Cables.

Friendly games were played, then local team Derbyshire Hill Rovers were taken over in April 1947, those players forming the nucleus of the team which entered the Liverpool County Combination at the start of the 1947/48 season. St. Helens Town soon began to prosper and early results included a sensational 10-4 win over Everton "A" on 6th December 1947. Former German prisoner-of-war Bert Trautmann joined the club in the Summer of 1948, the strapping goalkeeper helping the team to win its first trophy, the George Mahon Cup, which was secured with a 2-1 win over Runcorn at Prescot on 7th May 1949. Crowds averaged over 2000 that season, peaking with a league record attendance of 3012 against Burscough in October 1948.

The following season, 1949/50, Town entered the Lancashire Combination and, despite losing Trautmann to Manchester City in October 1949, they won the Second Division title in some style the



following season, three players, Albert Leadbetter (36), Harry McCann (32) and Terry Garner (31) all netting over 30 goals apiece. An all-time club record attendance of "between 8000 and 9000" witnessed a friendly game against Manchester City, arranged as part of the Trautmann transfer deal, in April 1950 and another 4000 witnessed a second match with City the following season.

Although relegated by a slender margin from the First Division in 1951/52, the club continued to look forward, even contemplating Football League status and, in order to further its ambitions, moved to the former St. Helens Recs. rugby league ground at City Road. Initial crowds were encouraging but, despite success, the club decided to move back to Hoghton Road in October 1953, where they remained until April 2000.

Town produced a number of fine players who joined Football League clubs, including Bill Foulkes (Manchester United), John Quinn (Sheffield Wednesday) and John Connelly who joined Burnley, later transferring to Manchester United and who played in the England 1966 World Cup winning squad. More recently, Dave Bamber scored goals in all four divisions of the league with a host of different clubs, starting and ending

his league career at Blackpool and in more recent times, Karl Ledsham, who had a productive career at conference level with Southport, Lincoln City, Barrow and Stockport County before moving to the USA.

Following a second relegation in 1956, St. Helens Town continued to play in the Lancashire Combination, winning the Championship in 1971/72, by nine points ahead of Accrington Stanley.

However, the formation of the Northern Premier League in 1968 led to a gradual drain of stronger clubs from the Combination and St. Helens joined the Cheshire League in 1975, becoming founder members of the North West Counties League seven years later. They held the proud record of being the only club



to play in the NW Counties' top flight every season until they were relegated in April 2015, conceding an injury-time equaliser to Silsden in the last game of the season, a match they had to win to stay up.

Town enjoyed a golden era in the late 1980s, just missing out on an appearance in the First Round proper of the FA Cup in 1985/86, losing to Morecambe in a Fourth Qualifying Round Replay, but they obtained ample compensation by winning the FA Vase at Wembley in 1987, beating near neighbours Warrington Town 3-2, with two goals from Phil Layhe and one from Brian Rigby.

They were regular promotion candidates for many years, largely due to the scoring exploits of Steve "Pellet" Pennington, who grabbed 216 goals in 351 games, his season's best hauls of 45 in 1993/94 and 46 in 1997/98 just failing to beat the club record of 47 scored by Phil Stainton in 1963/64. Former club captain Andy Gillespie won the NW Counties' golden boot with 34 goals in the 2015/16 season and netted another 24 times the following season.

Town moved from Hoghton Road in 2000 to ground share with St. Helens RFC, as part of the merger into the new Sporting Club St. Helens. Developing the new Saints stadium took years longer than anticipated, and when Knowsley Road closed in 2010 Town became nomads, plaig variously at Ashton Town, Ashton Athletic, Prescot Cables and Atherton Collieries. Town returned to St. Helens Borough in August 2017, playing on a 3G surface at Ruskin Drive, after St. Helens Council redeveloped the facilities.

The 2021-22 season saw Town in the NW CFL First Division North. It was a disastrous campaign, with only four wins and four draws from 36 league games. The club finished bottom of the table, 21 points adrift, and was relegated to the Liverpool County Premier League.

A consortium of Town fans bought the club from St. Helens RFC in Summer 2022. They took the decision to move it to the Cheshire League, believing it offered the most constructive environment in which to rebuild the club. It was a difficult decision, however, as it involved having to start at the bottom of that league system, a further two divisions down. The 2023/24 season was the club's first in Cheshire League Division 2. The following season Town finished 11 points clear having lost only one league game in the whole campaign, securing their first title for more than 50 years and promotion to Division 1.

The rebuild is ongoing.

## ST HELENS MOBILE COMMUNITY PANTRY

*You might spot me, or my Town in the Town colleagues Gill and Amber, collecting on matchdays on behalf of our 'Player of the Match' sponsors – the Mobile Food Pantry.*

The St Helens Mobile Food Pantry is making a real difference across our community. Operating at four weekly destinations around the borough – and as a regular fixture at both Saints home matches and LFC Women – the Pantry offers affordable food and essentials to families and individuals needing a helping hand.

We caught up with Pantry Coordinator Paul Cooper to hear more about how it works, the impact it's having, and how you can become a member.

**Q. For supporters who might not know, can you tell us what the Mobile Food Pantry is and how it works?**

A. The Mobile Food Pantry is an affordable food club that brings everyday essentials straight into local neighbourhoods. Whether you want to save good food from going to waste or need to stretch your household budget a little further, we're here for you. By shopping with the Pantry before heading to the supermarket, many people make significant savings on their weekly shop.

But the Mobile Pantry is about more than just food. Our friendly and knowledgeable team are always on hand with a listening ear, and can offer guidance or signpost members to other support services when needed.

**Q. How many people in St Helens are currently using the Pantry each week?**

A. The Mobile Pantry has over 1600 members, whose total household size is over 2% of the borough's population. The number of members who visit us at any one of our 4 weekly sessions varies but we have served over 60 members during a pantry session.

**Q. What makes the Pantry "mobile" – how do you decide where to go?**

A. The Mobile Pantry is mobile because everything from the gazebos, display tables, shopping baskets, stock and everything necessary to run the pantry is transported to our venues in our large pantry van. Enabling us to set out food pantries in 4 locations where a static pantry would not be possible due to lack of storage space for the stock and equipment, utilising one set of equipment and core stock to run four pantries. We travel to areas where we know there is a real need that have been highlighted on deprivation maps of the borough. We work with community centres, churches and family hubs who can host us. Being mobile means we can reach people who might not otherwise be able to access support.

**Q. What kinds of food and essentials do people receive when they come along?**

A. We offer a wide mix which varies depending on the season and availability—generally fresh fruit and vegetables, tinned and packaged foods, bread, dairy, and often household items like toiletries. The idea is to give families choice and dignity, so they can pick items that suit their household.

**Q. How do you make sure people feel welcome and supported, rather than judged?**

A. We greet everyone with kindness and respect. Our wonderful volunteers help to create a friendly atmosphere, and there are no intrusive questions or barriers—just a warm

welcome and a supportive environment.

**Q. Times are tough for many families – what difference does the Pantry make to people's everyday lives?**

A. It eases the pressure. Families tell us that using the Pantry helps them stretch their budget, put healthy meals on the table, and reduce the stress of having to choose between essentials like food, heating, or bills.

**Q. How do you source the food – is it donated, purchased, or a mix of both?**

A. It's a mix. We receive surplus stock from supermarkets and wholesalers, we purchase a large percentage of items to make sure there's always variety, and we rely on generous donations from local people and businesses and clubs like St Helens Town AFC.

**Q. Can anyone come along, or do you need to be referred?**

A. Anyone who lives in the borough of St Helens is welcome—there's no referral needed. We want the Mobile Pantry to feel like an outdoor community shop/market stall, open to anyone who needs a little extra help or those who like to help prevent good food going to waste.

**Q. How can local people or businesses support the Pantry's work?**

A. There are lots of ways such as donating food, toiletries, carrier bags or funds; volunteering time; or even just spreading the word so more families know we're here. Businesses can also partner with us to provide surplus stock or sponsorship.

**Q. Finally, what does it mean to you to see local clubs like St Helens Town AFC highlighting and supporting community projects like yours?**

A. It means the world. When local clubs stand with us, it raises awareness and shows the community that we're all in this together. It's not just about food—it's about solidarity, dignity and hope, and support from groups like St Helens Town AFC makes that message even stronger.

It's been great learning more about the amazing work our sponsors, the St Helens Mobile Food Pantry, do for our community.

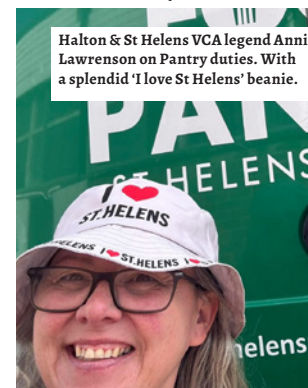

Town returned to winning ways away at Wythenshawe FC in this Cheshire league one clash against a reserve outfit with the gulf in class apparent straight from the kick off.

Charlie Simpson's physicality in a centre forward role showed in the early exchanges and Lewis Bateman would go close to scoring early on his league debut following his move from the north east.

Local lad Simpson was rewarded with the first goal on 22 minutes and the floodgates would open. A glancing header from Liam Diggle made it two and by half time Diggle would have his second for a 0-3 scoreline. As the game resumed for the second half, Simpson would soon also have a brace and his development over the past twelve months has been a major part of Town's progression.

The returning Will Clapham came off the bench to add a well taken fifth whilst a header from towering centre back Jack Critchlow and a strike from Makol Atem strike would put Town seven up before 80 minutes!

Taylor Prescott was involved in almost everything Town did going forward and his performance earned him the St Helens Borough Food Pantry player of the match award. It would be Prescott who laid on an eighth for Liam Diggle to complete his hat trick with a left foot finish close to full time.

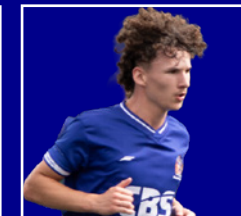

# TOWN IN ACTION

Styal FC 5 - 2 St Helens Town - August 30th

Town lost their unbeaten league record in a frustrating afternoon by conceding five goals away to Styal FC in rain soaked Wilmslow. In truth Town were never at the races and the three weeks off without a game which has followed Town's positive start to the season seemed to take a toll against a Styal team that were organised, physical and in good form. The writing was on the wall early when after two minutes it took Harry Long's lightning quick reflexes to head a Styal shot onto the Town bar and keep Jenkinson's goal in tact. It would be a temporary reprieve though as Styal would find the net on 16 minutes when the ball was punted forward by the home side and Simon beat the advancing Lewis Jenkinson to the ball to controversially prod Styal ahead with what appeared to be his shoulder. Town settled into the game though and we're almost level when a twisting run from Taylor Prescott enabled him to square the ball to Charlie Simpson but his left foot effort cleared the bar. That was as close as Town would come and on the stroke of half time the Marksmen were punished for a lack of creativity when Styal doubled their lead through Knight. The travelling fans that seemed to pack out the Alan Jones Stand at the Altrincham Road ground were hopeful of a second half turnaround but there would be further disappointment when a Styal free kick was headed home by Mathew Knight on 47 minutes. This seemed to kickstart a Town fightback as Prescott and substitute Ellis Morris would rally and a chance fell to Ryan Cook who smartly finished to give the blues some hope at 3-1. However it seemed the more Town tried, the more difficult it became and Styal would increase their lead with second goals for both Charlie Simon and Joe Knight. A late bright spot for Town was the excellent finish from Ben Noonan after a Prescott through ball but it ended 5-2 to Styal on a tough afternoon for the visitors. Ellis Morris took home the St. Helens Borough Food Pantry man of the match award and Town now move on to face Cheadle Heath at home next Saturday (6th September). Kick off is 3pm at the PSD Rentals Stadium, Ruskin with free entry courtesy of MCR Building Supplies. This past weekend also saw Town's under 18s team kick off their campaign in the ultra competitive North West Youth Alliance League with a 0-2 defeat at home to Atherton Collieries.
